FOUNDER'S NOTE

The Deaf Reach Digital Learning Program, born out of the challenges faced during the pandemic, has become a beacon of accessibility for the Deaf community, teachers of the Deaf, and families with deaf children. I am delighted to share that in the past year Deaf Reach has continued to grow as an organization and affirmed its role as a trailblazer in Deaf education and advocacy. Our journey over the years has been a transformative process of "Building Better" and with the steadfast support from our donors and partners we've been able to broaden our reach, extending our educational programs, skills training, and technology initiatives.

The severe floods in this past year hit one-third of Pakistan, particularly impacting our students and their families across rural Sindh. Homes were destroyed, lives upturned, and many struggled amid displacement and water-borne diseases. With donor support, we were able to provide relief funds to our students' families as well as to repair significant damage to our school buildings to ensure that no deaf child was left behind.

Empowering the Deaf community remains the beating heart of our mission. We have continued to create more employment opportunities for deaf youth, with upwards of 2,500 job placements to date, fostering financial independence and an improved quality of life. Through meaningful collaborations, especially with the provincial governments, we've increased opportunities for deaf youth and implemented impactful capacity building initiatives.

As we look ahead, our focus is shifting to the development of digital sign language learning resources. The Digital Learning Program, born out of the challenges faced during the pandemic, has become a beacon of accessibility for the Deaf community, teachers of the Deaf, and families with deaf children. This initiative transcends geographical borders, ensuring that educational learning resources are within easy reach for those who need them the most, and that no deaf child is without access to literacy and learning. Lastly, I am proud to share that our efforts have also gained international recognition. This year, Deaf Reach was honoured to receive the prestigious Hamdan-ICESCO award, originating from the UAE, acknowledging our exemplary contributions in the field of education in the Islamic world, an acknowledgement to the dedication and hard work of our Deaf Reach Team.

All of this has been made possible through the support of our partners and sponsors. It is through your unwavering commitment that we can look forward to making even greater strides as we continue to make education a reality for Deaf children in Pakistan.

According to demographics in Pakistan, there are over one million deaf children, yet less than 5% have access to education!

Deaf Reach is the only branch network of schools for the Deaf in Pakistan reaching out into rural and urban areas. Deaf Reach is continually expanding its programs to further empower marginalized deaf youth, the majority of whom are economically challenged, and to provide them with a brighter future. It operates with the aim to ensure that no deaf child goes without access to literacy and learning.

The program's innovative and holistic approach focuses on education and skills training for deaf children and youth, development of teachers and interpreters, Pakistan Sign Language (PSL) programs for parents and communities, advocacy, job placement, and the creation of sign language digital resources.



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MEET AIMAN

Isn't it ironic?

That the people you hold the closest often are the ones that isolate you. The ones you grow up with fail to understand you, and as much as you try to communicate with them, they only push you away.

I used to wonder if this was what the rest of my life would be like.

My name is Aiman, and I am 25 years old. I am currently studying at Deaf Reach while pursuing a part-time job along with running a full-time home-based business. However, the journey that has brought me here was not an easy one!

Growing up as the only deaf person in a family of eight siblings was extremely isolating. No one knew sign language. My daily routine consisted of helping out my mother with house chores and cuddled up in a corner all alone since there was no one to talk to. My siblings and relatives would often dismiss me and make fun of my deafness. They were of the opinion that there was no point in getting me educated since I was deaf. I was meant to be married off.

Financially, things had always been tough for us. My mother had to support us all as a single mother, which meant there were days when we did not have enough to eat or buy medicines in sickness. However, she was determined to send me to a good school and get me educated.

When she found out about Deaf Reach, she got me enrolled here right away. Although hesitant at first, when I came to Deaf Reach, I was shocked! All the communication was in sign language only and everyone understood it!

Deaf Reach became the ray of hope I had always been waiting for. I not only got a quality education, but I also got to learn so many new skills, made new friends, and most importantly, everyone understood me. Not only this, but Deaf Reach's Parent Training sessions also helped my family learn sign language which meant I could finally communicate with my own family!

Deaf Reach gave me the platform to further explore my passion for cooking. Today, I am running my own successful business of home-cooked meals and financially supporting my family. As my mother often says, "Aiman has become my right-hand! Even though I have 4 sons, but I call Aiman my 5th son."

I am incredibly proud to see the progress I have made.

My message to the entire world is that they should not think that deaf people are lesser than anyone. We are very strong!





REVOLUTIONIZING DEAF EDUCATION IN PAKISTAN

Deaf Reach operates with a firm belief that every child deserves the opportunity to learn, regardless of where they live or the barriers they face. Yet, for many deaf children in remote and underserved communities, access to education remains a tough challenge. Geographic barriers, limited financial resources, lack of specialized institutions, and an orthodox mindset among families especially in rural regions contribute to significant challenges, depriving deaf children of their basic right to literacy and learning.

In order to address this challenge, we are proud to share that Deaf Reach has launched 9 Satellite Schools across Pakistan, which continue to grow. These Satellite campuses serve the purpose of enabling access to quality education for deaf children far and wide in the country, especially in rural regions. By breaking down geographic and financial barriers, these campuses enable deaf students to access a supportive, inclusive learning environment within their own communities.

WHY IS THERE A NEED FOR THESE SATELLITE SCHOOLS?

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Accessibility

Provides education in remote areas where deaf education is otherwise unavailable.

Provides education within communities, eliminating the need for long-distance travel.

HOW DO THESE CAMPUSES OPERATE?

The Satellite schools operate as extensions of our larger Deaf Reach Centers of Excellence, leveraging the same high-quality curriculum, trained teachers, and specialized resources. We partner with local communities to access underutilized spaces, transforming them into fully functional classrooms. Each campus is equipped with 2 to 5 classrooms, furnished with desks, chairs, computers, and large screens to create an engaging and accessible learning environment. A solar set up powers the computer, lights and fans, ensuring continued learning when electricity is not available. The consistent quality of curriculum has been made possible through our Digital Learning Program (DLP), which has become a cornerstone of education at our Satellite campuses.

Our Digital Learning Program works to digitize sign-language learning resources to enable learning in or out of school, beyond the limited scope of brick-and-mortar schools. Using our DLP resources, our Satellite Schools provide a robust, sign language-based curriculum that includes digitized, interactive and specifically designed resources to meet the unique learning needs of deaf students.



Our Warah Satellite Campus stands as a prime example of how we continue to revolutionize the deaf education landscape in Pakistan.

Mushtag, a deaf leader in Warah, has been teaching deaf students in his local community in an informal setup in a small, shabby building for over 20 years. In the day he runs his tailoring shop, and in the evenings gathers the deaf children in his area for informal classes. His journey with Deaf Reach began in 2004 when he attended classes at our first small Saddar school. After graduating, he has tried his best over the years to provide some measure of basic education for the deaf children in his village.

However, despite his efforts, Mushtag faced significant challenges in sustaining the school financially. All of his students came from underprivileged families, often lacking basic necessities such as clothes and shoes, and the school itself lacked proper infrastructure.

Recognizing the need, we partnered with Mushtag to come up with a solution.

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WARAH: A CASE STUDY

We rented and renovated a small building, creating a safe school environment for the children. We equipped the school with furniture, computers, and a large screen to facilitate interactive learning through our especially curated DLP content. To ensure sustainability, we installed a solar battery system, along with lights, fans, and a water supply to create a comfortable space for students and teachers. To ensure top-quality teaching standards, qualified teachers were hired and then trained.

Today, our Warah Satellite School provides a structured, sign language-based curriculum, giving deaf students access to education and opportunities that would be otherwise unavailable in the area. It has given deaf children in Warah their first opportunity to access quality education and develop skills that will help turn their dreams into reality.

THE DEAF KARATE CHAMPIONS

Growing up as deaf girls and having all these achievements, is not an easy task!

Our whole life has been an echo of a few repeated statements: "They're deaf! They are not capable of anything!" "Why do they need to go to school if they're deaf? They should be married off." "They are deaf girls. There's no way they can perform well."

But we managed to break all these stereotypes and proved them wrong!

We were born deaf. Our mother, the person who understood us the most, passed away when we were nine years old. We lived in a small village in the rural area of Sindh province. Our father drove a rickshaw and ran a local pan shop as he always tried his best to provide for us. However, the communication gap at home was immense as no one knew sign language and we could not even communicate with our own father. Our relatives saw us as helpless and a burden on our father. However, he was determined to send us to school and get the best education possible.

When we joined Deaf Reach in 2014 at their newly opened campus in Rashidabad, Tando Allahyar, we felt, like stepping into a whole new world. For the first time, we felt seen; we felt understood. Everyone spoke our language, connected with us, and encouraged us. We finally felt like we belonged somewhere.

In our sports classes we were introduced to Karate, a self-defence system that promotes life skills and self-discipline. What began as a small skill soon became our passion.

People are often surprised to see how well we perform, doubting our abilities especially when they find out we are deaf. Every win not only proves them wrong, but is an encouragement to every deaf child who is told they cannot achieve some goal.

We have competed at both regional and national levels, and have won against hearing competitors, showing people who doubted us that we could stand toe-to-toe with anyone, regardless of our deafness.

Our dream is to continue to excel and eventually teach Karate to deaf children, giving them the same strength and confidence that we have gained. Deaf Reach gave us the space to learn and grow, and to realize there are no limits as to what we can do!

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
DEAF REACH'S STUDENTS INVITED AT THE PLF

THE FIRST HIGHER SECONDARY SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

We are delighted to announce a significant milestone in our mission to make quality education accessible to the Deaf community. Deaf Reach has proudly become the first-ever Higher Secondary School for deaf children in the Hyderabad and Sukkur regions of Sindh province.

This represents a monumental step forward, allowing us to reach more deaf children, especially girls, particularly in rural areas of Sindh. By expanding into these underserved areas, these children are not only provided with the opportunity to continue their education beyond primary and middle school but are also being equipped with the skills and knowledge needed to pursue their dreams.

DEAF REACH AND DEPD ENHANCE SPECIAL NEEDS EDUCATION

In collaboration with the Department of Empowerment of Persons with Disabilities (DEPD - Government of Sindh), Deaf Reach initiated an immersive training program to enhance the skills and capabilities of the 400 educators working with special needs children in the 66 DEPD centers across Sindh.

In the initial 6-month phase, we are proud to have trained 140 candidates, developing their proficiency in Pakistan Sign Language as well as equipping them with the best inclusive teaching strategies.

We look forward to continuing this program in the new school year, empowering educators to effectively address the unique educational needs of their students. With deaf children being in majority at these centers, it is essential to ensure that the teaching strategies are adapted to meet their learning needs.

This project represents a significant step forward in safeguarding our deaf students, equipping them with the tools they need to navigate their environments safely and confidently, both online and offline.

9th ANNUAL DEAF REACH CHARITY GOLF TOURNAMENT, KARACHI






LEGAL STATUS
